### ***Report on the Financial Statements***

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Robein Grade School District No. 85 as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014 as listed in the table of contents and the related notes to the financial statements.

### ***Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements***

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the financial reporting provisions prescribed and permitted by the Illinois State Board of Education. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### ***Auditor's Responsibility***

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. The effects on the financial statements of the variances between the regulatory basis of accounting described in Note #1 and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonably determinable, are presumed to be material.

***Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles***

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter discussed in the “Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles” paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of each fund of Robein Grade School District No. 85 as of June 30, 2014, or changes in financial position for the year then ended.

***Basis for Qualified Opinion***

The District has omitted disclosures required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 45 *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Post-Employment Benefits Other Than Pensions*. The amount by which this disclosure would affect the financial statements is not reasonably determinable.

***Qualified Opinion on Regulatory Basis of Accounting***

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter discussed in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Robein Grade School District No. 85 as of June 30, 2014, and its revenue received and expenditures disbursed during the fiscal year then ended and the respective budgetary comparison statements, in accordance with the financial reporting provisions prescribed by the Illinois State Board of Education and described in Note #1.

***Other Reporting Responsibilities******Supplemental Information***

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The supplementary schedules on pages 23 through 26, statistical section on pages 27 through 29 and the itemization schedule on page 33, and Schedules for Trust and Agency Funds are presented for the purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements of Robein Grade School District No. 85. Such information, except for the average daily attendance figure, included in the computation of operating expense per pupil on page 28 and per capita tuition charges on page 29, is the responsibility of management and has been derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole. The information on pages 28-30 is propagated from information in the audited financial statements, but we take no responsibility for the accuracy of those calculations.

***Other Information***

The information provided on pages 2 through 4, and page 36 are presented for the purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements of Robein Grade School District No. 85. The Report on Shared Services or Outsourcing on page 31 contains unaudited information concerning prior, current, and future year expenditures which was provided by the District. The Administrative Cost Worksheet on page 32 contains unaudited information concerning the current year budget which was provided by the District. The actual expenditure information on this page is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole. The average daily attendance figure, included in the computation of operating expense per pupil on page 28 and per capita tuition charges on page 29, have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

The Table of Contents references a Federal Compliance Section on Pages 37-46; however, this District was not required to have a Single Audit and this section has not been completed.

***Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards***

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued a report dated **DATE, 2014**, on our consideration of Robein Grade School District No. 85 internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. ### **Report on Internal Control and Compliance**

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Robein Grade School District No. 85 as of and for the year ended June 30, 2014 and the related notes to the financial statements which collectively comprise Robein Grade School District No. 85's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated **DATE, 2014**. Our opinion was adverse because the financial statements are not prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. However, the financial statements were found to be fairly stated, except for the effects of the omitted disclosures required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 45, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Post-Employment Benefits Other Than Pensions*, on the cash basis of accounting, in accordance with regulatory reporting requirements established by the Illinois State Board of Education, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Robein Grade School District No. 85's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Robein Grade School District No. 85's internal control. Accordingly we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Robein Grade School District No. 85's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. However, as described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control that we considered to be material weaknesses and significant deficiencies.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the school district's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider the deficiencies described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as Finding 2014-001 to be material weaknesses.

**Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Robein Grade School District No. 85's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as Finding 2014-002.

**Robein Grade School District No. 85's Response to Findings**

Robein Grade School District No. 85's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Robein Grade School District No. 85's responses were not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

**Purpose of this Report**

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Note #1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The District's accounting policies conform to the cash basis of accounting as defined by the Illinois State Board of Education Audit Guide.

A. Principles Used to Determine the Scope of the Reporting Entity

The District's reporting entity includes the District's governing board and all related organizations for which the District exercises oversight responsibility.

Component Units

The District has developed criteria to determine whether outside agencies with activities that benefit the citizens of the District, including joint agreements which serve pupils from numerous districts, should be included within its financial reporting entity. The criteria includes, but is not limited to, whether the District exercises oversight responsibility (which includes financial interdependency, selection of governing authority, designation of management, ability to significantly influence operations, and accountability for fiscal matters), scope of public service, and special financing relationships.

Joint agreements have been determined not to be part of the reporting entity after applying the manifesting of oversight, scope of public service, and special financing relationships criteria and are, therefore, excluded from the accompanying financial statements because the District does not control the assets, operations, or management of the joint agreements. In addition, the District is not aware of any entity which would exercise such oversight as to result in the District being considered a component unit of the entity.

B. Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting

The accounts of the District are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets and liabilities (arising from cash transactions), fund balance, revenue received, and expenditures disbursed. The District maintains individual funds required by the State of Illinois. The various funds are summarized by type in the financial statements. These funds are grouped as required for reports filed with the Illinois State Board of Education. District resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The following funds and account groups are used by the District:

Governmental Funds -

Governmental funds are those through which most governmental functions of the District are financed. The acquisition, use, and balances of the District's expendable financial resources and the related liabilities (arising from cash transactions) are accounted for through governmental funds.

The Educational Fund is the general operating fund of the District. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

The Debt Services Fund accounts for the accumulation of resources for and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

The Operations and Maintenance Fund, Transportation Fund, and Illinois Municipal Retirement/Social Security Fund are used to account for cash received from specific sources (other than those accounted for in the Debt Services Fund or Fiduciary Funds) that are legally restricted to cash disbursements for specified purposes.

Governmental Funds - (cont'd.)

The Working Cash Fund accounts for financial resources held by the District to be used for temporary interfund loans to the other funds.

The Tort Fund accounts for financial resources held by the District to be used for tort immunity and tort judgment purposes.

The Fire Prevention and Safety Fund is used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major facilities (other than those financed by Trust Funds).

Fiduciary Funds -

Fiduciary funds are used to account for assets held by the District in a trustee capacity or as an agent for individuals, private organizations, other governments, or other funds.

The Agency Funds include Student Activity Funds, Memorial and Scholarship Funds, and Convenience Accounts. They account for assets held by the District as an agent for the students, teachers, and other entities. These funds are custodial in nature and do not involve the measurement of the results of operations. The amounts due to the activity fund organizations are equal to the assets.

Governmental and Expendable Trust Funds - Measurement Focus

The financial statements of all Governmental Funds and Expendable Trust Funds focus on the measurement of spending or "financial flow" and the determination of changes in financial position rather than upon net income determination. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (cash receipts and other financing sources) and decreases (cash disbursements and other financing uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of "available spendable resources" during a period.

General Fixed Assets and General Long-Term Debt Account Group

All fixed assets are valued at historical cost or estimated historical cost if actual historical cost is not available. Donated fixed assets are valued at their estimated fair value on the date donated. The District records purchases of property and equipment as expenditures of various funds when paid. The District maintains a detailed list of property and equipment purchased for insurance.

The District does not have a formal capitalization policy, but follows grant guidelines when applicable.

No depreciation has been provided on fixed assets in these financial statements. The Illinois State Board of Education's Annual Financial Report (ISBE Form SD50-35/JA50-60) includes depreciation of \$54,777 which has been utilized for the calculation of the per capita tuition charge, and accumulated depreciation totaling \$1,039,710. Depreciation has been computed over the estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method.

Long-term liabilities expected to be financed from Debt Services Funds are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group, not in the governmental funds. Proceeds from sales of bonds are included as receipts in the appropriate fund on the date received. Related principal payable in the future is recorded at the same time in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

The two account groups are not "funds". They are concerned only with the measurement of financial position. They are not involved with measurement of results of operations.

C. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues received and expenditures disbursed are recognized in the account and how they are reported in the financial statements. The District maintains its accounting records for all funds and account groups on the cash basis of accounting under guidelines prescribed by the Illinois State Board of Education. Accordingly, revenues are recognized and recorded in the accounts when cash is received. In the same manner, expenditures are recognized and recorded upon the disbursement of cash. Assets of a fund are only recorded when a right to receive cash exists, which arises from a previous cash transaction. Liabilities of a fund, similarly, result from previous cash transactions.

Cash-basis financial statements omit recognition of receivables and payables and other accrued and deferred items that do not arise from previous cash transactions.

Proceeds from sales of bonds are included as other financing sources in the appropriate fund on the date received. Related principal payable in the future is recorded at the same time in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

D. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The budget for all Governmental Funds is prepared on the cash basis of accounting which is the same basis that is used in financial reporting. This allows for comparability between budget and actual amounts. This is an acceptable method in accordance with Chapter 105, Section 5, Paragraph 17.1 of the Illinois Compiled Statutes. The budget, which was not amended, was passed on September 19, 2013.

For each fund, total fund expenditures disbursed may not legally exceed the budgeted amounts. The budget lapses at the end of each fiscal year.

D. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting (cont'd.)

The District follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected on the financial statements:

1. Prior to July 1, the Superintendent submits to the Board of Education a proposed operating budget for the fiscal year commencing on that date. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures disbursed and the means of financing them.
2. A public hearing is conducted to obtain taxpayer comments.
3. Prior to October 1, the budget is legally adopted through passage of a resolution.
4. Formal budgetary integration is employed as a management control device during the year.
5. The Board of Education may make transfers between the various items in any fund not exceeding in the aggregate 10% of the total of such fund as set forth in the budget.
6. The Board of Education may amend the budget (in other ways) by the same procedures required of its original adoption.

E. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash includes amounts in demand deposits and time deposit (savings) accounts. Cash equivalents include amounts in time deposits, and other investments, with original maturities of less than 90 days.

F. Investments

Investments are stated at cost or amortized cost, which approximates market. The District, under 30 ILCS 235/2, may legally invest in all securities guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the United States, as well as interest-bearing savings accounts, certificates of deposit, or time deposits constituting direct obligations of banks insured by FDIC and savings and loan associates insured by FSLIC. The District may also invest in short-term obligations of the Federal National Mortgage Association, the Public Treasurer's Investment Pool, and all interest-bearing obligations of the State of Illinois.

G. Inventories

Inventory consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost is recorded as an expenditure disbursed at the time the individual inventory items are purchased.

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Note #2 - Property Taxes

The District's property tax is levied each year on all taxable real property located in the District on or before the last Tuesday in December. Taxes are levied in Tazewell County. The levy was passed by the board on December 18, 2013. Property taxes attach as an enforceable lien on property as of January 1 and are payable in two installments on June 1 and September 1. The District receives significant distributions of tax receipts approximately one month after these due dates. Property taxes recorded in these financial statements are from the 2012 and prior tax levies.

The Property Tax Extension Limitation Law of the State of Illinois, as amended (PTELL), limits the amount of annual increase in property taxes to be extended for certain Illinois non-home rule units of government, including this district. In general, the PTELL restricts the amount of a property tax extension increase to the lesser of 5% or the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Consumers during the preceding calendar year. Tax levies may also be increased due to assessed valuation increases from new construction, referendum approval, and consolidation of local government units. The effect of the PTELL is to limit the growth of the amount of property taxes that can be extended for a taxing body. The PTELL was effective for Tazewell County for property taxes levied after 1998.

Note #3 – Fund Balance Reporting

According to Government Accounting Standards, fund balances are to be classified into five major classifications: Nonspendable Fund Balance, Restricted Fund Balance, Committed Fund Balance, Assigned Fund Balance, and Unassigned Fund Balance. The Regulatory Model, followed by the District, only reports Reserved and Unreserved Fund Balances. Below are definitions of the differences and a reconciliation of how these balances are reported.

A. Nonspendable Fund Balance

The nonspendable fund balance classification includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form or (b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. The “not in spendable form” criterion includes items that are not expected to be converted to cash, for example, inventories and prepaid amounts. Due to the cash basis nature of the district, all such items are expensed at the time of purchase, so there is nothing to report for this classification.

B. Restricted Fund Balance

The restricted fund balance classification refers to amounts that are subject to outside restrictions, not controlled by the entity, such as restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws and regulations of other governments, or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Special Revenue Funds are, by definition, restricted for those specified purposes. The District has several revenue sources received within different funds that also fall into these categories:

1. Special Education

Cash receipts and the related cash disbursements of this restricted tax levy are accounted for in the Educational Fund. Expenditures disbursed exceeded revenue received for this purpose, resulting in no restricted fund balance.

2. Leasing Levy

Cash disbursed and the related cash receipts of this restricted tax levy are accounted for in the Educational Fund. Expenditures disbursed exceeded revenue received for this purpose, resulting in no restricted fund balance.

3. State Grants

Proceeds from state grants and the related expenditures have been included in the Educational, Operations and Maintenance, and Transportation Funds. At June 30, 2014, expenditures disbursed did not exceed revenue received from state grants, resulting in a restricted fund balance of \$64,250.

4. Federal Grants

Proceeds from federal grants and the related expenditures have been included in the Educational Fund. At June 30, 2014, expenditures disbursed exceeded revenue received from federal grants for those specific purposes, resulting in no restricted fund balance.

5. Social Security

Cash disbursed and the related cash receipts of this restricted tax levy are accounted for in the Municipal Retirement/Social Security Fund. Revenue received exceeded expenditures disbursed for this purpose, resulting in a restricted fund balance of \$33,291. This balance is included in the financial statements as Reserved in the Municipal Retirement/Social Security Fund.

C. Committed Fund Balance

The committed fund balance classification refers to amounts that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the government's highest level of decision making authority (the School Board). Those committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the government removes or changes the specified use by taking the same type of formal action it employed to previously commit those amounts.

The School Board commits fund balance by making motions or passing resolutions to adopt policies or to approve contracts. Committed fund balance also incorporates contractual obligations to the extent that existing resources in the fund have been specifically committed for use in satisfying those contractual requirements.

Employee contracts for services rendered during the school year for employees electing twelve month pay schedules are recorded as disbursements in the fiscal year when such checks are drawn. At June 30, 2014, the total amount of unpaid contracts for services performed during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014 amounted to \$129,114. This amount is shown as Unreserved in the Educational Fund.

D. Assigned Fund Balance

The assigned fund balance classification refers to amounts that are constrained by the government's intent to be used for a specific purpose, but are neither restricted nor committed. Intent may be expressed by (a) the School Board itself or (b) the finance committee or by the Superintendent when the School Board has delegated the authority to assign amounts to be used for specific purposes.

E. Unassigned Fund Balance

The unassigned fund balance classification is the residual classification for amounts in the General Operating Funds for amounts that have not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the General Funds. Unassigned Fund Balance amounts are shown in the financial statements as Unreserved Fund Balances in the Educational and Working Cash Funds.

F. Regulatory – Fund Balance Definitions

Reserved Fund Balances are those balances that are reserved for a specified purpose, other than the regular purpose of any given fund. Unreserved Fund Balances are all balances that are not reserved for a specific purpose other than the specified purpose of a fund.

G. Reconciliation of Fund Balance Reporting

The first five columns of the following table represent Fund Balance Reporting according to generally accepted accounting principles. The last two columns represent Fund Balance Reporting under the regulatory basis of accounting utilized in preparation of the financial statements.

H. Expenditures of Fund Balance

Unless specifically identified, expenditures act to first reduce restricted balances, then committed balances, next assigned balances, and finally unassigned balances. Expenditures for a specifically identified purpose will act to reduce the specific classification of fund balance that is identified.

Note #4 – Deposits and Investments

The District is allowed to invest in securities as authorized by the District's investment policy, Sections 2 and 6 of the Public Funds Investment Act (30 ICS 235), and Section 8-7 of the School Code of Illinois. These include the following items:

- (1) in bonds, notes, certificates of indebtedness, treasury bills, or other securities now or hereafter issued, which are guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the United States of America as to principal and interest;
- (2) in interest-bearing savings accounts, interest-bearing certificates of deposits, interest-bearing time deposits, or any other investments constituting direct obligations of any bank as defined by the Illinois Banking Act;
- (3) in short term obligations of corporations organized in the United States with assets exceeding \$500,000,000;
- (4) in money market mutual funds registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, provided that the portfolio of any such money market mutual fund is limited to obligations described in (1) or (2) above and to agreements to repurchase such obligations;
- (5) in short term discount obligations of the Federal National Mortgage Association or in shares or other forms of securities legally issuable by savings banks or savings and loan associations incorporated under the laws of this State or any other state or under the laws of the United States;
- (6) in dividend-bearing share accounts, share certificate accounts, or class of share accounts of a credit union chartered under the laws of this State or the laws of the United States; provided, however, the principal office of any such credit union must be located within the State of Illinois;
- (7) in a Public Treasurer's Investment Pool created under Section 17 of the State Treasurer Act;
- (8) in the Illinois School District Liquid Asset Fund Plus;
- (9) in repurchase agreements of government securities having the meaning set out in the Government Securities Act of 1986 subject to the provisions of said Act and the regulations issued thereunder;
- (10) in any investment as authorized by the Public Funds Investment Act, and Acts amendatory thereto. Paragraph 10 supersedes paragraphs 1-9 and controls in the event of conflict.

**Custodial Credit Risk Related to Deposits with Financial Institutions**

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the government's deposits may not be returned to it. The District's general investment policy requires all amounts deposited or invested with financial institutions in excess of any insurance limit shall be collateralized by securities eligible for District investment or any other high-quality, interest-bearing security rated at least AA/Aa by one or more standard rating services to include Standard & Poor's, Moody's, or Fitch. The market value of the pledged securities shall equal or exceed the portion of the deposit requiring collateralization.

The District's investment policy states the preferred method for safekeeping of collateral is to have securities registered in the District's name and held by a third-party custodian. Safekeeping practices should qualify for the Governmental Accounting Standards Board's Statement III, Category I, the highest recognized safekeeping procedures.

**Custodial Credit Risk Related to Deposits with Financial Institutions** (cont'd.)

At June 30, 2013, the carrying amount of the District's deposits with financial institutions, which includes demand deposits, savings accounts, and certificates of deposit, was \$2,604,271. The bank balance was \$2,661,001. As of June 30, 2014, the following District's bank balances (certificates of deposit, checking, and savings accounts) were exposed to custodial credit risk as follows (carrying amounts are presented as additional information only):

Risk Class #1 includes deposits that are insured or collateralized with securities held by an independent financial institution.

Risk Class #2 includes deposits that are uninsured and collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution.

Risk Class #3 includes deposits which are uninsured and collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent, but not in the district's name.

Risk Class #4 includes deposits which are uninsured and uncollateralized.

During the year ended June 30, 2014, the depository banks used by the District pledged \$2,890,576, in securities to secure the District's deposits in excess of the amount insured by the FDIC. The pledged securities are held by an independent financial institution's trust department in the district's name.

**Custodial Credit Risk of Investments**

Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the District will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. At year end, none of the District's investments were subject to custodial credit risk due to one of the following:

- Investments were part of an insured pool
- Investments were book-entry only in the name of the District and were fully insured
- Investments were part of a mutual fund
- Investments were held by an agent in the District's name

**Interest Rate Risk**

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of investments will decrease as a result of a rise in interest rates. The District's investment policy does not limit investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

**Credit Risk**

The Public Funds Investment Act contained in the Illinois Compiled Statutes limits the types of investments a public agency may purchase. The investment policy adopted by the district does not limit further its investment choices.

**Concentration of Credit Risk**

Concentration of credit risk is the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of an investment in a single issuer. Disclosures are required for any issuer that represents 5% or more of total investments, exclusive of mutual funds, external investment pools and investments issued or guaranteed by the U.S. government. The District's investment policy places no limit on the amount the District may invest in any one issuer.

**Investments**

As of June 30, 2014, the District had no investments.

Note #6 - Retirement Fund Commitments

A. Teacher's Retirement System of the State of Illinois

The District participates in the Teacher's Retirement System of the State of Illinois (TRS). TRS is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that was created by the Illinois legislature for the benefit of Illinois public school teachers employed outside the city of Chicago

The Illinois Pension Code outlines the benefit provisions of TRS, and amendments to the plan can be made only by legislative action with the Governor's approval. The state of Illinois maintains the primary responsibility for funding the plan, but contributions from participating employers and members are also required. The TRS Board of Trustees is responsible for the system's administration.

TRS members include all active nonannuitants who are employed by a TRS-covered employer to provide services for which teacher certification is required. The active member contribution rate for the year ended June 30, 2014, was 9.4 percent of creditable earnings. The same contribution rate applies to members whose first contributing service is on or after January 1, 2011, the effective date of the benefit changes contained in Public Act 96-0889. These contributions, which may be paid on behalf of employees by the employer, are submitted to TRS by the employer. The active member contribution rate was also 9.4 percent for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012.

The state of Illinois makes contributions directly to TRS on behalf of the district's TRS-covered employee.

**On-behalf contributions to TRS.** The State of Illinois makes employer pension contributions on behalf of the district. For the year ended June 30, 2014, State of Illinois contributions were based on 35.41 percent of creditable earnings not paid from federal funds, and the district recognized revenue and expenditures of \$299,045 in pension contributions that the State of Illinois paid directly to TRS. For the years ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012, the State of Illinois contribution rates as percentages of creditable earnings not paid from federal funds were 28.05 percent (\$249,404) and 24.91 percent (\$244,779), respectively.

The district makes other types of employer contributions directly to TRS.

**2.2 formula contributions.** Employers contribute 0.58 percent of total creditable earnings for the 2.2 formula change. This rate is specified by statute. Contributions for the year ended June 30, 2014, were \$4,900. Contributions for the years ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012, were \$5,158 and \$5,699, respectively.

**Federal and special trust fund contributions.** When TRS members are paid from federal and special trust funds administered by the district, there is a statutory requirement for the district to pay an employer pension contribution from those funds. Under a policy adopted by the TRS Board of Trustees that has been in effect since the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, employer contributions for employees paid from federal and special trust funds will be the same as the state contribution rate to TRS. Public Act 98-0674 now requires the two rates to be the same.

For the year ended June 30, 2014, the employer pension contribution was 35.41 percent of salaries paid from federal and special trust funds. For the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the employer contribution was 28.05 and 24.91 percent, respectively. For the year ended June 30, 2014, salaries totaling \$0 were paid from federal and special trust funds that required employer contributions of \$0. For the years ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012, required district contributions were \$34 and \$3, respectively.

**Early Retirement Option (ERO).** The district is also required to make one-time employer contributions to TRS for members retiring under the Early Retirement Option (ERO). The payments vary depending on the age and salary of the member.

The maximum employer ERO contribution under the current program is 146.5 percent and applies when the member is age 55 at retirement.

For the year ended June 30, 2014, the district paid \$0 to TRS for employer contributions under the ERO program. For the years ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012, the district paid \$0 and \$0, respectively.

**Salary increases over 6 percent and excess sick leave.**

If an employer grants salary increases over 6 percent and those salaries are used to calculate a retiree's final average salary, the employer makes a contribution to TRS. The contribution will cover the difference in actuarial cost of the benefit based on actual salary increases and the benefit based on salary increases of up to 6 percent.

For the year ended June 30, 2014, the district paid \$0 to TRS for employer contributions due on salary increases in excess of 6 percent. For the years ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012, the district paid \$0 and \$0, respectively.

If an employer grants sick leave days in excess of the normal annual allotment and those days are used as TRS service credit, the employer makes a contribution to TRS. The contribution is based on the number of excess sick leave days used as service credit, the highest salary rate reported by the district during the four-year sick leave review period, and the TRS total normal cost rate (17.29 percent of salary during the year ended June 30, 2014).

For the year ended June 30, 2014, the district paid \$0 to TRS for sick leave days granted in the excess of the normal annual allotment. For the years ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012, the district paid \$0 and \$0, respectively.

TRS financial information, an explanation of TRS benefits, and descriptions of member, employer and state funding requirements can be found in the TRS *Comprehensive Annual Financial Report* for the year ended June 30, 2013. The report for the year ended June 30, 2014, is expected to be available in late 2014.

B. THIS Fund Contributions

The District participates in the Teacher Health Insurance Security (THIS) Fund, a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit postemployment healthcare plan that was established by the Illinois legislature for the benefit of Illinois public school teachers employed outside the City of Chicago. The THIS Fund provides medical, prescription, and behavioral health benefits, but does not provide vision, dental, or life insurance benefits to annuitants of the Teacher's Retirement System (TRS). Annuitants not enrolled in Medicare may participate in the state-administered participating provider option plan or choose from several managed care options. Beginning February 1, 2014, annuitants who were enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B may be eligible to enroll in Medicare Advantage plans.

The State Employees Group Insurance Act of 1971 (5 ILCS 375) outlines the benefit provisions of THIS Fund and amendments to the plan can be made only by legislative action with the Governor's approval. Effective July 1, 2012, in accordance with Executive Order 12-01, the plan is administered by the Illinois Department of Central Management Services (CMS) with the cooperation of TRS. Section 6.6 of the State Employees Group Insurance Act of 1971 requires all active contributors to the TRS who are not employees of the state make a contribution to THIS Fund.

The percentage of employer required contributions in the future will be determined by the director of Healthcare and Family Services and will not exceed 105 percent of the percentage of salary actually required to be paid in the previous fiscal year.

- **On behalf contributions to THIS Fund.** The State of Illinois makes employer retiree health insurance contributions on behalf of the District. State contributions are intended to match contributions to THIS Fund from active members, which were 0.97 percent of pay during the year ended June 30, 2014. State of Illinois contributions were \$8,192 and the District recognized revenue and expenditures of this amount during the year.

State contributions intended to match active member contributions during the year ended June 30, 2013 and June 30, 2012 were 0.92 and 0.88 percent pay, respectively. State contributions on behalf of District employees were \$8,181 and \$8,647, respectively.

- **Employer contributions to THIS Fund.** The District also makes contributions to THIS Fund. The District THIS Fund contribution was 0.72 percent during the years ended June 30, 2014, and 0.69 and 0.66 percent during the years ended June 30, 2013 and June 30, 2012, respectively. For the year ended June 30, 2014, the District paid \$6,081 to the THIS Fund. For the years ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012, the District paid \$6,136 and \$6,486, respectively, which was 100 percent of the required contribution.

C. Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund

*Plan Description.* The District's defined benefit pension plan for Regular employees provides retirement and disability benefits, post-retirement increases, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The District's plan is affiliated with the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF), an agent multiple-employer plan. Benefit provisions are established by statute and may only be changed by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois. IMRF issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained on-line at [www.imrf.org](http://www.imrf.org).

C. Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (cont'd.)

*Funding Policy.* As set by statute, the District's Regular plan members are required to contribute 4.50 percent of their annual covered salary. The statutes require employers to contribute the amount necessary, in addition to member contributions, to finance the retirement coverage of its own employees. The employer annual required contribution rate for calendar year 2013 was 12.45 percent. The District also contributes for disability benefits, death benefits, and supplemental retirement benefits, all of which are pooled at the IMRF level. Contribution rates for disability and death benefits are set by the IMRF Board of Trustees, while the supplemental retirement benefits rate is set by statute.

*Annual Pension Cost.* The required contribution for calendar year 2013 was \$23,876.

The required contribution for 2013 was determined as part of the December 31, 2011, actuarial valuation using the entry age normal actuarial cost method. The actuarial assumptions at December 31, 2011, included (a) 7.5 percent investment rate of return (net of administrative and direct investment expenses), (b) projected salary increases of 4.00% a year, attributable to inflation, (c) additional projected salary increases ranging from 0.4% to 10.0% per year depending on age and service, attributable to seniority/merit, and (d) post-retirement benefit increases of 3% annually. The actuarial value of the District's Regular plan assets was determined using techniques that spread the effects of short-term volatility in the market value of investments over a five-year period with a 20% corridor between the actuarial and market value of assets. The District's Regular plan's unfunded actuarial accrued liability at December 31, 2011 is being amortized as a level percentage of projected payroll on an open 30 year basis.

*Funding Status.* As of December 31, 2013, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the Regular plan was 73.13 percent funded. The actuarial accrued liability for benefits was \$583,336 and the actuarial value of assets was \$426,596, resulting in an underfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) of \$156,740. The covered payroll for calendar year 2013 (annual payroll of active employees covered by the plan) was \$191,775 and the ratio of the UAAL to the covered payroll was 82 percent.

Vacation Pay – Vacation pay is considered to be an expenditure in the year paid. Eligible administrators and support staff receive vacation pay. At June 30, 2014, the estimated unused vacation pay liability is \$0.

Sick Pay – Sick pay is considered to be an expenditure in the year paid. Accumulated sick pay benefits are available to eligible employees to use in future years. Sick pay does not vest if not used during the term of employment with the District.

Note #15 - Joint Agreements

The District is a member of Tazewell-Mason County Special Education Association, along with other area school districts. The District's pupils benefit from programs administered under this joint agreement, and the District benefits from jointly administered grants and programming. The District does not have an equity interest in the joint agreement. The joint agreement is separately audited and is not included in these financial statements. Financial information for Tazewell Mason County Special Education Association can be obtained directly from their office located at 300 Cedar St., Pekin, Illinois 61554.

Note #16 - Risk Management - Claims and Judgments

Significant losses are covered by commercial insurance for all major programs: property, liability, and worker's compensation. During the year ended June 30, 2014, there were no significant reductions in insurance coverage. Also, there have been no settlement amounts which have exceeded insurance coverage in the past three years.

The District is insured under a guaranteed cost plan for worker's compensation coverage. The initial premium may be adjusted based on actual payroll covered. Adjustments in premiums are recorded when paid or received. During the year ended June 30, 2014, there were no significant adjustments in premiums based on actual experience.

Note #17 - Self-Insurance Plan

All employees of the district are covered under the State of Illinois Unemployment Insurance Act. The district elected to be self-insured and, therefore, is liable to the State for any payments made to an unemployed worker claiming benefits.

Note #18 – Subsequent Events

The District evaluates events and transactions that occur subsequent to year-end for potential recognition or disclosure in the financial statements through the date of the Independent Auditors' Report, which is date the financial statements were available to be issued. There were no material subsequent events that required recognition or additional disclosure in these financial statements.

**3. Criteria or specific requirement**

105ILCS 5/8-2 Bond of Treasurer requires that every school treasurer post a surety bond "before entering upon his duties." The bond must provide a penalty of 25% of "all bonds, notes, mortgage, moneys and effects of which the treasurer has custody at any time." The bond must be approved by the governing school board and filed with the regional superintendent of schools.

**4. Condition**

During the fiscal year under audit, management failed to cover 25% of the highest available balance (cash and investments) with a School District Treasurer's Bond.

**5. Context**<sup>12</sup>

During the fiscal year under audit, the District's highest available balance (cash and investments) was \$3,243,752. 25% of that amount is \$810,938. The District's Treasurer's Bond was for \$593,750.

**6. Effect**

For the entire fiscal year, the District was not adequately covered by a Treasurer's Bond.

**7. Cause**

The District's available balances were higher during the year than anticipated.

**8. Recommendation**

The District should raise the Treasurer's Bond coverage to ensure covering 25% of the maximum amounts available during the year, or monitor cash and investment balances more closely, in order that more coverage be purchased when needed.

**9. Management's response**<sup>13</sup>

Management will review the expected monthly revenues and expenditures and will increase the Treasurer's Bond coverage if needed.
